Universities currently recruiting/supporting African/Sudanese Students

New York University Center for the Study of Africa and the African Diaspora 2024-2025 Fellowship

The CSAAD Research Fellowship invites scholars based and living in Africa and the Diaspora (outside of North America and Europe), who have completed the PhD within the last four years, to submit applications for the opportunity to spend either one or two semesters at New York University. The fellowship is open to scholars in the Humanities and Social Sciences, and the research must focus on some aspect(s) of Africa or its Diaspora.

The Fellowship will provide a studio apartment, cover airfare, and provide a stipend of \$35,000 per semester - from either September 1, 2024 - January 12, 2025; or January 16, 2025 - May 31, 2025.

Wolfson College, Cambridge University, Pamela K. Omidyar Trust Scholarship for Students from Sudan

This scholarship of £35,000-£40,000 is intended to support students from Sudan whose education has been disrupted by the conflict in that country. It is funded by a generous gift from the Pamela K Omidyar Trust to Wolfson College. The College will seek additional partnerships in order to increase the size and number of the awards available.

Masters in International and Regional Studies (MIRS), University of Michigan

This is an MA-only program but could be a stepping stone to applying to a funded PhD program at Michigan or elsewhere. This program is run through the “International Institute”, which has centers that focus on different regions of the world. Sudanese students could apply through the African Studies Center or the Center for Middle East and North African Studies. Students in MIRS can design most of their own program of study, so it could focus on archaeology, heritage, museums, and related fields. Applications due December 15 each year.

Applications are invited for one PhD research position of one-year, starting as early as possible in 2024 and renewable once with three additional years, to carry out ethnographically informed archaeological research within the ERC-funded CongUbangi project led by Prof. Dr. Sara Pacchiarotti at the Department of Languages and Cultures at Ghent University in Ghent, Belgium (<http://www.talenenculturen.ugent.be>). Within this department, the student will operate in the UGent Centre for Bantu Studies (<http://research.flw.ugent.be/en/bantugent>), associated with the UGent African Studies program (<http://www.africanstudies.ugent.be>). All nationalities are welcome to apply; selected candidates are expected to relocate to Ghent, Belgium.
